And then came March! And the shutdown! Here's where our Community of Faith came together in a new way – figuratively and virtually. We all learned very quickly how to Zoom, how to write "Letters of Hope" to keep people's spirits buoyed during this ongoing tumultuous journey for us all.

Through this time, our Council, Teams, Working Groups and individuals persevered in creative ways to maintain the integrity of our Worship services, meetings, and group functions like Bible Study, Meditation etc. Many people stepped forward to assist with Worship services during these past few months lightening the load for our beloved Rev. Kate as she dealt with the pressures of this ongoing pandemic situation.

I feel it necessary to acknowledge the consistent generosity that our Community of Faith has shown in supporting Huron Shores United Church financially throughout this troubling time. #### **MINISTER**

"My refuge, my fortress, my God in whom I trust." Psalm 91:2

This is a year unlike any other, in some regards. But utterly like all of them in one key way: we remained faithful to Jesus Christ and his ministry of hospitality and of grace.

When the pandemic hit, we learned in a new way what we had once learned as children: the church is the people. Our doors were locked tight, but the church escaped into the world. It didn't take us too long before we 'pivoted' and learned how to gather as a loving community in new ways: Zooming to Church, dropping Letters of Hope to folks without computers, and reaching out through porch visits, phone calls, and drive bys. You just can't keep God's people under a bushel!

My own year was unlike any other just like yours, but also in one special way: eleven weeks of Restorative Care leave, brought on by what in the olden days would have been called a breakdown. But I wasn't broken, and I wasn't down – so I think of it as stress overload. Just like you can't plug a kettle and a microwave and an electric drill all into one outlet and run them at the same time, it seems that you can't pile too much on a minister without her circuit breaking. It was not just church, of course, as my father's 16-week hospitalization contributed significantly to my stress load.

I was lifted and carried by your kindness. In the words of the Rev. Kevin Steeper, the Pastoral Minister for Western Ontario Waterways Regional Council, I had to let the Body of Christ care for me. It has been over two decades since I 'sat in the pew' and simply received. What a healing gift. There are congregations which would have crumbled under the stress, and turned against their settled minister. Instead, **Charles MacDonald**, the Chair of the Ministry and Personnel Team, rallied the leaders of the church, ensuring that weekly worship continued while I was protected from the burden of leadership, until I could return to work. When I did, I found everything running smoothly, and our whole Council of leaders smiling and ready to welcome me back. There is nothing sweeter!

Many, many thanks go to the team with whom I work: **Janna McFadden-Oud**, who completely rewrote her job description to become the electronic hub of our congregation; **Elva McIntyre**,



our Music Director, delved into a new ministry of *talking about music* until we can get together to sing again; **Carey Eddy**, our Envelope Secretary, who keeps track of our donations with unending positivity; **Sherrie Smith**, our Bookkeeper, does far more than she should for us, and we know it; **Bob Stewart**, our Custodian, who expresses our hospitality through cleanliness and order; **Rev. Elise Feltrin**, our Community Wellness Program Coordinator, gone now, but who brought so much to our congregation in her exciting role, and **Janice Sinker** who guided our community with strength and wisdom through a time none of us saw coming, or could have imagined.

#### **STEWARDSHIP**

Throughout 2020 the Stewardship Working Group, reporting through the Finance team, continued to inform the congregation of ways they could support the financial needs of Huron Shores United Church and expressed gratitude to all for their contributions.

Once again, October was Stewardship Month in conjunction with the month's spiritual messages of Thanksgiving. Weekly announcements in Shorelines spoke of various methods available for giving such as personal envelopes, PAR (pre-authorized remittance) encouraging year-round financial support, Special Envelopes, and Grocery/Gift Card purchases. 'Celebration Gifts' were promoted as a means to commemorate a special occasion, birthday, marriage, or family member's memory with a gift to HSUC.

The congregation were informed as to how their contributions to Huron Shores United Church are used in general operations, as well as how they could assign portions of their donations to specific programs including debt retirement or the Mission and Service Fund.

Special envelopes were provided again this year for donations at Easter and in October to celebrate our 6<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Donations this year were gratefully accepted as a means to help meet our anticipated Operation budget shortfall.

A weekly announcement in Shorelines was created to provide information on five ways to financially support HSUC during these unprecedented times.

A key part of the Stewardship program is 'gratitude'. Members and adherents of HSUC <u>are</u> greatly appreciated for their financial contributions of whatever they can give to the ongoing support of the church's operations and projects. The Donor Wall outside the Sanctuary expresses gratitude to all those who have financially contributed to the HSUC building renovations. We recognize that there are so many others in our community who contribute to our present and future, not only of monetary treasures but also gifts of their time, and talents.

Our Church Council, on a recommendation from the Stewardship Team, decreed 2020 as the Year of Gratitude. Each month, in Shorelines, we recognized, celebrated and expressed our gratitude to those who make up our teams and working groups here at Huron Shores United Church. These individuals work very hard behind the scenes to make our Church such a vibrant community.

## **COMMUNITY WELLNESS**

With great hopes for a year ahead filled with Wellness Events for both the congregation and the community, over twenty people gathered in the Fellowship Hall on New Year's Day 2020 for a relaxing afternoon of homemade soup and classic board games. Dominoes, Scrabble and various card games kept people competitively engaged and cheerfully entertained. The conviviality continued with the weekly Cabin Fever Coffee Club which began on January 9<sup>th</sup> and carried on every Thursday afternoon throughout the winter. People took turns hosting and bringing treats as conversation and camaraderie were shared among the 10-20 people who regularly gathered. Live music by Tom Taylor was even offered on a few occasions. Many thanks to Di Campbell for her dedication in organizing.

Meaningful conversation continued over a few wellness-themed documentaries which were sponsored: a couple with the Alzheimer's Society screened at the Huron County Museum in Goderich, and 'The Great Disconnect' shown in the Huron Shores sanctuary in partnership with the Grand Bend and Area Health Centre. Over 40 people attended and stayed for discussion over refreshments around the topical issue of social isolation and how to build healthy communities.

Little did we know, that 'social isolation' was about to engulf the world in the form of COVID 19.

The closure of the church building on March 13, caused the Community Wellness Program to take on a new spin as physical isolation became everyone's new reality. The Cabin Fever Coffee Club relocated to the Zoom platform where a handful of dedicated participants continued to gather and socialize in this virtual space. 'Wellness' became shared through my written weekly contribution to the Letters of Hope along with thorough researching and publishing online health and wellness resources in the Shorelines newsletter. Plans for a Soul Collage Workshop, a Circle of Friends event and participation in the Grand Bend Studio Tour were all put on indefinite hold. Instead, I attended online meetings of the hastily created Pandemic Support Network and leant my assistance to Kate in reaching out to the congregation. I helped complete many Elder's calls – which was another wonderful way to connect with people and personally check on their health and wellbeing.

The unexpected surprises of 2020 continued with my decision to accept a call to Chemainus United Church and move to Vancouver Island. While sad to not complete my contract with Huron Shores as Community Wellness Coordinator, I was excited with the opportunity to relocate and be closer to my daughters. Even after giving my notice, unanticipated change continued to occur as I stepped into the role of Pastoral Charge Supervisor and pastoral care coverage during the Restorative Care Leave of Rev. Kate.

2020 has definitely not unfolded as any of us would have predicted and yet it has certainly been a year of being responsive to God's Spirit 'blowing where it will.' Adapting to changing circumstances, reacting to evolving needs and discovering creative solutions have proven to be characteristics of faithful witness, in addition to being indicators of wholeness and harbingers of wellness! I greatly appreciate the opportunity for the personal and professional growth and learning I experienced while serving at Huron Shores.

## COMMUNITY WELLNESS PROGRAM

Thanks to the on-going support The New Ministries grant from The United Church of Canada Foundation our Community Wellness Program has been able to carry on. The Rev. Elise Feltrin started our 2020 program on New Year's Day with a lunch and games afternoon in the Fellowship Hall just before noon. It was attended by approximately 20 people from HSUC and the wider community. For a little more than 3 hours people gathered and enjoyed some nice treats and board games. Those attending were very appreciative for the opportunity.

On January 16 from 14:00-15:00, we started the Cabin Fever Cafe which ran until the beginning of June. Until COVID-19 closed the church building there were up to 20 people attending. During this time we provided tea, coffee, water and an assortment of treats, along with music by Tom Taylor. It worked very well with some members of the greater community helping to organize cabin Fever cafe. However, with COVID-19 and the church building closing, we moved to Cabin Fever Cafe by Zoom. We continued with the Zoom format with our own drinks at home. Our numbers varied as many people were reluctant or learning how to navigate Zoom. In June, it was decided to stop for the summer months and restart in the fall. Volunteers were not forthcoming, so we hope to have Cabin Fever Cafe running in early 2021.

We did have several events planned and cancelled due to COVID-19. Some of which were an Introduction to Collage Workshop, a Food Safety Handling Course and a Studio Arts Tour, to name a few.

Elise through COVID-19 continued to keep in touch throughout the community through the Community Health Center weekly Pandemic meetings. She was investigating a labyrinth for the Main Street garden, complete with a community bulletin board.

However, over the winter she also received a very timely call to Chemainus United Church in Chemainus BC. Which she accepted and which allows her to be closer to her daughters. Elise finished with HSUC at the end of August and a few members of Council took her to lunch and presented her with a gift from HSUC. In mid-September she moved to BC.

The Community Wellness Program Working Group (CWPWG) met in Oct to discuss the future of the program. We decided that it would be prudent, due to COVID-19, to wait until early 2021 to start the search for another Community Wellness Program Coordinator, and informed our donor, The United Church of Canada Foundation, of this decision. Other grant recipients have been doing the same.



The Christian Development Committee ordered the *Seasons of the Spirit* online Sunday school curriculum for ages 5 - 12 for the 2019/2020 Sunday School year. This curriculum works well for the program that we run during non-COVID-19 times. Normally during Sunday School, teachers Julie Ciufo or Ann Russell will do a small teaching or lesson from the curriculum and a craft or game.

Our two consistent Sunday school students are Brynn and Phoenix. Phoenix enjoys a short lesson and some time to play with the Sunday school toys.

Due to COVID-19, a Sunday School curriculum was not purchased for 2020/2021.

Julie and Brynn Ciufo lead a Zoom youth message two Sundays per month.

<u>Angel Tree by Ann Russell</u> This year the Angel Tree was done independently. We shared the information on when and where to send your donation. Let's hope that next year, we can go back to purchasing gifts.

<u>Adult Opportunities by Reverend Kate Crawford</u> Adult Opportunities for Christian Development fall largely to me - although volunteer program leaders are always welcome!

- \* **Community Bible Study** continued strong this year, working with the Sunday morning readings as well as the biblical book *Revelation*. During COVID-19, we first formed an email community, called The Ribbon, and then found our new home in Zoom. Folks from Owen Sound and even St. John's, Newfoundland have popped in and joined us (friends and family of regular members). The welcome is always warm, and the tea is always hot if you make it yourself! Join us any time if you need a great group of crazy people who love to talk about stuff that matters.
- \* **Grand Bend Vipassana Meditation** at first side-lined by COVID-19, we soon found ourselves a space online. Kate's leave left us with a few months in the summer away from each other. Then, we invited Judy Myers Avis to lead an 8-week course to strengthen our practice. Her wisdom and strength were a great help to us all. Donations at the end were directed to HSUC Outreach Fund.
- \* **Jesus at the Movies** our film/sermon series started out well, with several films showed in Lent in our sanctuary. Good-sized groups gathered to watch the films, and enjoyed hearing how it could be preached along with the gospel the following Sunday. This came to an abrupt halt in March, of course.
- \* **BLUE** (**Bluewater Lambton Ukulele Ensemble**) was rocking and rolling each week in the Fellowship Hall as 2020 began. Pivoting to online gatherings was impossible, due to the limitations of Zoom technology with music. A number of socially distant gatherings and strums were held through the summer in different outdoor locations in Grand Bend, tapering off as our fingers froze in the fall. We eagerly await warmer weather and vaccinations.


#### CONGREGATIONAL VISITORS

Congregational Visitors are re-appointed yearly at the Annual Congregational Meeting and January 26, 2020 we were confirmed in our roles. With the COVID-19 pandemic, the role of the Congregational Visitor adapted. No longer were visits in person possible and the telephone was our means of keeping in touch. Many of these calls were to shut-ins, listening to them and extending compassion as they dealt with significant life moments. It was heart-warming and very rewarding to chat with others and share stories.

In the spring, members of Council and some volunteers reached out to everyone associated with our community, to extend a caring call from the congregation. These calls were assisted by our Community Wellness Coordinator, as she reinterpreted her role in the face of the pandemic. So many folks were grateful that "the church" had called. As we moved into late fall, with COVID-19 still present, the Congregational Visitors felt the need to reintroduce the phone calls to our community, so they initiated The Phone Tree. Several members of our church community came forward; volunteering to become part of The Phone Tree team; to reach out regularly with telephone calls so that all members of our church community feel connected. The calls began in December and will continue in 2021.

#### MINISTRY & PERSONNEL

The Ministry and Personnel Team is the congregation's supervisor of staff. To do that, we monitor their job performance and take all concerns and compliments and ensure they are properly addressed. Our team consists of myself as chair, Maxine Eveland, Ernie Lane and Bob Fuller who joined us during this past year. We are a small team and are always seeking new members to join our team. Normally, we meet a few times a year, and do informal checks with staff regularly throughout the year. In December we perform job interviews/performance reviews. When it comes to budgeting, we recommend salary increases to Finance, in keeping with United Church of Canada guidelines. With the church building closing our staff needed to stay home and work through phones, email and social media with Zoom being our medium of choice for most meetings.

Sadly, we lost our Community Wellness Coordinator, The Rev. Elise Feltrin. She found a new calling in Chemainus BC at Chemainus United Church and is closer to her daughters. She was a great asset to HSUC leaving a large hole in our HSUC family. With COVID-19 still with us we have decided to wait until early February before we start to look for a new CWC.

Janna Oud was our only staff member to continue to visit the church to pick up and distribute mail and do only necessary work in the office. For all staff, Janna was the umbilical cord to the church and her hours grew because of the situation we found ourselves in.

Rev Dr Crawford (Kate) had a very difficult year in 2020. Firstly, her sabbatical was deferred due to COVID-19. Through various means she kept the congregation together, informed and she started Zoom worship for our community of faith which has been very successful. Alas, in June she had an emotional breakdown which saw her on RCP (Restorative Care Plan) until mid-September. With the help of the congregation, she has had a successful return to work progressively, growing stronger with time.

Our Congregational Visitors have been busy this year keeping in touch with many of our congregants. Along with Kate and Melodie Northey they have been busy updating our church records.

Our staff greatly appreciates all that we do to assist them in the performance of their jobs. We remind the congregation that they can provide input to the Ministry and Personnel Team relating to our staff. If you see a problem that is staff related, tell one of the Ministry and Personnel Team. On behalf of the Ministry and Personnel Team, we thank our staff: Rev. #### MISSION & OUTREACH

Our team was able to carry out the monthly Minutes for Mission. Marion Ogilvie, our Mission and Service Enthusiast and chosen members presented updates by Zoom each month.

Roz MacDonald & myself, collected, counted & banked tourist parking dollars, five times over the summer time. We were able to assist locals in need with the following 4 cheques:

- **\$500** Hillside Elemetary School (Kettle & Stony Point)
- **\$1000** Stephen Central Public School (Dashwood)
- \$788 B Community Health Center "We Can Help Fund" (Medical Social Dept.) For a Senior in need.
- \$1800 "We Can Help Fund" (Social Dept.) Lise Callahan to distribute

Total: \$4088

For a year filled with restrictions, due to COVID-19, HSUC Mission and Outreach Team were still able to help the community.

The Free Store & Food Bank donations of food were not able to work as usual once the building closed. We are eager to start these programs again as soon as possible. Our two local <u>Foodbanks</u>, Blessings and Ailsa Craig, receive monthly distributions of donated funds. The <u>Adopt-the-Beach</u> program has ended after many years, and we thank Lee McCutcheon for his long-standing efforts to organize volunteers to do beach sweeps after long weekends in the summer season. The <u>Right Relations Working Group</u> has been able to continue meeting on-line, primarily focusing on the Reading group. A number of interesting books were promoted to the community through the year, along with a viewing of several short National Film Board films on Indigenous issues.

In March, we recognized Doris Bestard's 90th birthday. March 9 was our last meeting as the coronavirus forced us all to return to our homes and isolate. The virus stopped our meetings but not the knitting and crocheting! Everyone was happy to have yarn at home and to continue working. An email account was set up for our group and we kept in contact through email updates, shared poems and songs. We were still connected.

Mid-August there was a "possibility" that we might start meeting again in September but that soon changed and we remained at home. In late August, we received notice that "Aunt Rose" Frim had passed away just a few days before her 98th birthday. She was an avid knitter and a great supporter of our group and attended whenever she was in our area. In August, I picked up all the yarn from the Church and made a few house calls for those who were running short so that we could keep on working.

In the fall, we added a new item to our list of available items. Butterflies made by Jean Glazier were included and have been well received.

November and December were busy months with requests and we also made some new contacts who were pleased to receive our gifts. In addition to Jessica's House, we added Hoffman's Funeral Home, Huron Women's Shelter and Parkhill Nursing Home. In November and December alone, we gave out 19 prayer bears, 67 pocket prayer shawls, 35 prayer shawls, 11 butterflies and 2 afghans.

We also kept Janna busy printing the cards for us to attach to each item. Thank you, Janna!

This brings our total donations to 411 prayer bears, 623 pocket prayer shawls, 747 prayer shawls, 11 butterflies and 2 afghans.

We are grateful for the yarn donations made to our group this year. Yarn is expensive and these donations offer a variety of yarns to help keep our hands busy. All donations are appreciated.



#### WORSHIP

"You can't allow the past to steal your present, but if you siphon off just the right amount, it can help fuel your future." This is a quote from the book, <u>I Know Who You Are</u>, by Alice Feeney.

It remains to be seen what we have learned from our experience in 2020 that we will need to apply to the next stages in our worship planning. What we can do is recall the stages that we have encountered.

#### Covid-19

When our awareness of Covid 19 rose to the surface the first step was to close our building on March 15. The major focus then became the need to somehow provide some continuity for our members.

Moderator Richard Bott appropriately provided YouTube services that those with computers could access. Many other churches also recorded worship we could access...again with computers. Kate presented "The Gathered Community" every Tuesday and Thursday for those who could access on Facebook. Letters of Hope written by Kate (and later by many others) were sent out by Janna first every day and later every Wednesday. By April 22 some of us had learned enough to set up Bible Study on Zoom. (Catch your breath here!)

Kate encouraged some of us to record readings for an online Good Friday worship service and by May 3 we were brave enough to present the first Zoom Sunday morning service. A tech team of volunteers came together and haven't stopped since. Hallelujah! When Kate had her medical leave Bob Illman, Charles MacDonald and Roz MacDonald carried us through the trials and

glitches of virtual church admirably with care and great patience. Our music director had a change in career and found herself finding new ways to keep in touch with the choir and the congregation with weekly notes and music suggestions. Melodie Northey and Pat Lane also took turns on the tech team and bravely learned new skills. As Chair of Ministry and Personnel, Charles MacDonald, coordinated Sunday morning worship leadership, and Ruth Anne Eagleson came on alongside to assist in chairing the Worship Team.

#### **Settling In On-Line**

The Covid-19 Reopening Working Group presented a survey to congregants to determine their views on eventual re-opening. Results were presented on July 26 at a general meeting after church indicating a consensus to remain closed. We have continued to provide Zoom church weekly and have enjoyed many special services. We have celebrated our 6<sup>th</sup>. Anniversary, communion at home, Remembrance Day with Charles MacDonald, New Members Sunday and joined WOW for the ordination service. For Advent we each were encouraged to design an Advent wreath and light our candles simultaneously at home during Zoom church. A unique Christmas Eve service was available to watch any time after Dec. 21 and as many times as you like, featuring readers, singers and a Virtual Choir, for the first time ever!

#### REGIONAL COUNCIL

The second year of the Western Ontario Waterways Regional Council in the United Church of Canada proved to be a true year of new beginnings as it adjusted to Covid-19 and went virtual.

WOW representatives: Bob Illman, Rosalind MacDonald, Ruth Ann Eagleson and Rev. Kate Crawford attended the Western Ontario Waterways Regional Council Fall 2020 Virtual Meeting on Thursday October 15th to 17th, as well as The Celebration of Ministries Service (Ordination) on Sunday, October 18.

The theme of the Conference was 'Honey from the Rock' from Psalm 81: 16. As in the scripture, we gained a 'taste of sweetness' or 'Honey' from our experiences. The moderator, The Right Rev. ## **GROCERY CARDS**

Although COVID 19 has disrupted our lives in many ways, one thing hasn't changed – we still eat every day. For most of us, that means that grocery "gift" cards are still a convenient way to pay for our groceries. Even if someone else goes to the store for you, payment can be made using a gift card.

Throughout 2020 we have continued to take gift card orders and have raised \$5464.25, even slightly surpassing the 2019 total. What a feat! Thanks to everyone who disregarded the inconvenience of being unable to meet in church to give and receive orders and came to our house instead. We enjoy your brief porch visits while observing COVID precautions.

A number of families are now using what we call PAP. They are placing one repeating order at the beginning of the year along with 12 post-dated cheques for monthly orders. No monthly cheque writing or forgetting to place your order. It works for them, maybe not for you. Either way, when the cards are received, they are left on a table on our front porch but only after you have indicated that you are picking them up at a certain time. There is no direct contact between people, and social distancing is observed. Steve Northey & Charles MacDonald have been very helpful in delivering cards to anyone in Grand Cove and those who might not be able to pick up their cards. Thanks Steve and Charles.

So far, this fundraiser has netted more than \$46,500. That's why we keep doing it. In 2020 we had participation from 46 families. We aim for at least \$5000 in orders from each of the two companies, Sobeys and PC, since the percentage discount is greater at that level. We usually meet that objective but with the participation of more families, we could be assured of reaching that target every month. If you are not participating and would like to give it a try, you would be supporting our church financially at no cost to anyone. And you benefit from a tax break for your contribution to the congregation.
